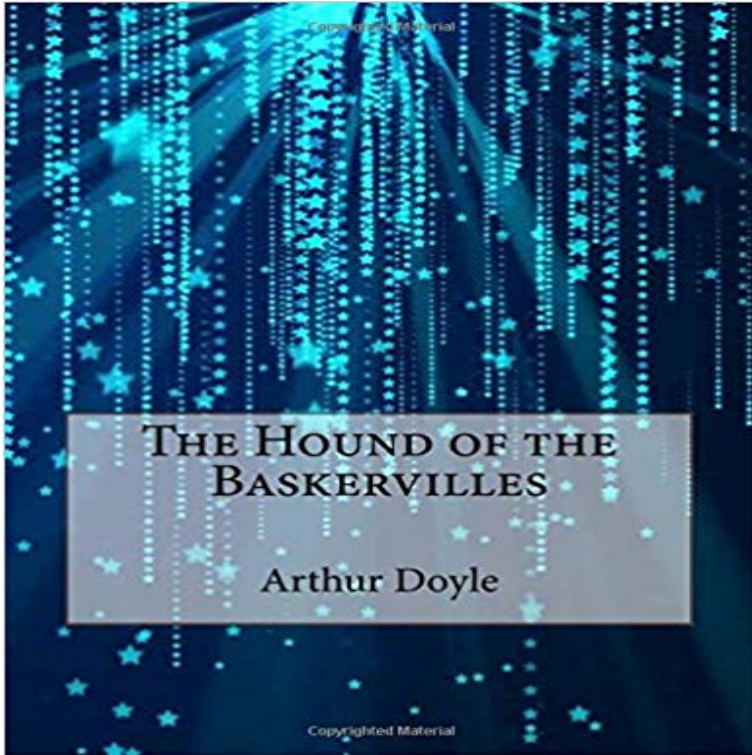


The Hound of the Baskervilles
